- This is what I learned: (Daniel 4:34-37)
 - --God humbles the Proud
 - --God is sovereign

Nebuchadnezzar's Dream (Daniel 4:10-17)

- Life was going on just fine
- Then I had a disturbing dream: there was a big tree that supplied food and shelter to the birds in it and the animals underneath it
- But a "watcher" from the sky came down and commanded that the tree be cut down, except for its stump
- And the watcher declared that the man will look and think and eat like an animal for "seven seasons"
- So people realize that "the Most High rules the kingdom of men and gives it to whom he will and sets over it the lowliest of men."

The metal band = your kingdom will not be divided



Nebuchadnezzar's request of Daniel (Daniel 4:8-9)

- The wise men of the Babylonians could not interpret the dream
- Finally, Daniel came in, and I knew that he could interpret the dream

Daniel's interpretation of the dream (Daniel 4:24-26)

- You yourself is the tree, for "your greatness has grown and reaches to heaven, and your dominion to the ends of the earth." (verse 22)
- ²⁴ this is the interpretation, O king: It is a decree of the Most High, which has come upon my lord the king, ²⁵ that you shall be driven from among men, and your dwelling shall be with the beasts of the field. You shall be made to eat grass like an ox, and you shall be wet with the dew of heaven, and seven periods of time shall pass over you, till you know that the Most High rules the kingdom of men and gives it to whom he will. ²⁶ And as it was commanded to leave the stump of the roots of the tree, your kingdom shall be confirmed for you from the time that you know that Heaven rules.

Daniel's compassionate advice (Daniel 4:27)

 ²⁷ Therefore, O king, let my counsel be acceptable to you: break off your sins by practicing righteousness, and your iniquities by showing mercy to the oppressed, that there may perhaps be a lengthening of your prosperity."

Twelve months later, while admiring my works



Pride preceedeth a fall

- "Is not this great Babylon, which I have built by my mighty power as a royal residence and for the glory of my majesty?"
- ³¹ While the words were still in the king's mouth, there fell a voice from heaven, "O King Nebuchadnezzar, to you it is spoken: The kingdom has departed from you, ³² and you shall be driven from among men, and your dwelling shall be with the beasts of the field.

From the highest king to the lowest beast
