

Habakkuk's Psalm of Praise (Habakkuk 3:17-19)

"Quid pro Quo"

- (Latin: "what for what" or "something for something") A favor or advantage granted or expected in return for something else
- "I will vacuum your car if you do the dishes for me"
- "I owe you one"
- A result of living in a "transactional society"? (Primary focus on one's self-interest and getting ahead in society)
- I will follow the Lord if he provides blessings on me → If I follow the Lord, He is obligated to provide blessings to me → "The Prosperity Gospel"

C. Content/Framework

1. Habakkuk's frustration over God's delay of justice (lament)

2. Habakkuk lodges two complaints against God

- 3. Habakkuk's journey of trust in the faithfulness of God
- 4. Habakkuk's song of praise to God

I. Even during times of material scarcity . . .

 Though the fig tree should not blossom, nor fruit be on the vines, the produce of the olive fail and the fields yield no food, the flock be cut off from the fold and there be no herd in the stalls,

--Habakkuk 3:17

II. Praise the Lord!

yet I will rejoice in the LORD;
I will take joy in the God of my salvation.

--Habakkuk 3:18

Jonathan Edwards on Freedom of the Will

- "yet I will rejoice in the LORD" (V. 18A)
- "the Will . . . is *That by which the mind chooses anything* . . . An act of the will is the same as an act of choosing or choice" (p. 7)

- Willpower is needed to make a decision. But how does one choose?
- "It is that motive, which, as it stands in view of the mind, is the strongest that determines **the will**"
- We choose that which we want the most . . . "Conditioning"
- "Choose this day whom you will serve . . . But as for me and my house, we will serve the LORD" (Joshua 24:15 ESV)

Deeper Blessings

- "I will take joy in the God of my salvation" (v. 18b)
- A personal relationship with the Lord brings joy/contentment:
- "Not that I speak from [any personal] need, for I have learned to be content [and self-sufficient through Christ, satisfied to the point where I am not disturbed or uneasy] regardless of my circumstances." (Philippians 4:11 Amplified Bible)
- "Salvation": "The saving of [human beings] from the power and effects of sin. . . . From a root word meaning width, spaciousness, freedom from constraint, hence deliverance"
- Un-carry the weight of sin


God equips us to thrive regardless of the situation

Connecting Habakkuk to the Rest of Bible

 "Habakkuk carries on the biblical story in grand fashion—that the Creator, Redeemer God will do something about human iniquity, while his people live in hope and with faithful trust in him" (How to Read the Bible Book by Book, p. 247)

God will do something about human iniquity

• 9 If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness. (1 John 1:9 NIV) [Reflect]

- Because *the sentence against an evil deed is not executed quickly*, therefore the hearts of the sons of men among them are given fully to do evil. (Ecclesiastes 8:11)[Patience required]
- Thus I will punish the world for its evil
 And the wicked for their iniquity;
 I will also put an end to the arrogance of the proud
 And abase the haughtiness of the ruthless. (Isaiah 13:11) [God is just]

The End of the Matter: Live by Faith

• "We have been assured by people who think they know a great deal about the future that awful times are coming. Be it so; it need not alarm us, for the Lord reigneth. Stay yourself on the Lord . . .
