### Luke 19:28-40 ESV

<sup>28</sup> And when he had said these things, he went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. <sup>29</sup> When he drew near to Bethphage and Bethany, at the mount that is called Olivet, he sent two of the disciples, <sup>30</sup> saying, "Go into the village in front of you, where on entering you will find a colt tied, on which no one has ever yet sat. Untie it and bring it here. <sup>31</sup> If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' you shall say this: 'The Lord has need of it.'"


<sup>32</sup> So those who were sent went away and found it just as he had told them. <sup>33</sup> And as they were untying the colt, its owners said to them, "Why are you untying the colt?" <sup>34</sup> And they said, "The Lord has need of it."

### Luke 19:28-40 ESV

35 And they brought it to Jesus, and throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. 36 And as he rode along, they spread their cloaks on the road. 37 As he was drawing near—already on the way down the Mount of Olives—the whole multitude of his disciples began to rejoice and praise God with a loud voice for all the mighty works that they had seen, 38 saying, "Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!"

<sup>39</sup> And some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, rebuke your disciples." <sup>40</sup> He answered, "I tell you, if they were silent, the very stones would cry out."

# **A Question of Identity**

Who IS this Jesus?

#### I. Prophesies of the Arrival of the Messiah

• **Zechariah's prophesy of the future** (c. 520 B.C. after the defeat of Babylonians by the Medes and Persians in 540 B.C.):

Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion!
 Shout aloud, O daughter of Jerusalem!
 Behold, your king is coming to you;
 righteous and having salvation is he,
 humble and mounted on a donkey,
 on a colt, the foal of a donkey. (Zechariah 9:9)

#### II. A. Celebrating the Arrival of the Messiah

- Only John's gospel identifies the branches as palm branches
- The next day the large crowd that had come to the feast heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem. <sup>13</sup> So they took **branches of palm trees** and went out to meet him, crying out, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord" (John 12:12-13a)

#### II. A. Celebrating the Arrival of the Messiah

• <sup>38</sup> saying, "Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!" (Luke 19:38)

#### Connections to the Old Testament:

• Save us, we pray, O LORD! . . . Blessed is he who comes in the name of the LORD! (Psalm 118:25,26)

#### II. A. Celebrating the Arrival of the Messiah

- But the crowd expects a military Messiah:
- 13 So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, crying out, "Hosanna! ["Save Now!] Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, even the King of Israel!" (John 12:13)
- A reenactment of when the Israelites drove out their occupiers—the Syrians/Seleucid empire—in c. 161 B.C. . . . [The Romans later conquered the Israelites in c. 63 B.C.]
- "When **Simon Maccabee** drove Israel's enemies out of Jerusalem, people celebrated by waving palm branches: 'On the twenty-third day of the second month, in the one hundred seventy-first year [of Persian rule], the Jews entered it **with praise and palm branches**, and with harps and cymbals and stringed instruments, and with hymns and songs, because a great enemy had been crushed and removed from Israel' (1 Maccabees 13:51 NRSV)" [Esau McCaulley *Christianity Today*].

# II. B. Willfully "Unseeing" the Arrival of the Messiah (Luke 19:39)

- Religious leaders refuse to recognize Jesus as the promised Messiah:
- And some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "**Teacher ["Rabbi"]**, rebuke your disciples." (Luke 19:39)
- The disciples had also been slow to recognize Jesus as the Messiah:
- Now they had forgotten to bring bread, and they had only one loaf with them in the boat. <sup>15</sup> And he cautioned them, saying, "Watch out; beware of the leaven of the Pharisees and the leaven of Herod [the Herodians]." <sup>16</sup> And they began discussing with one another the fact that they had no bread. <sup>17</sup> And Jesus, aware of this, said to them, "Why are you discussing the fact that you have no bread? Do you not yet perceive or understand? Are your hearts hardened? <sup>18</sup> Having eyes do you not see, and having ears do you not hear? And do you not remember? <sup>19</sup> When I broke the five loaves for the five thousand, how many baskets full of broken pieces did you take up?" They said to him, "Twelve." (Mark 8:14-19)

# III. "Wonderful" Moment of Opportunity (Luke 19:40)

- Jesus is better than a military leader:
- Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion!
  Shout aloud, O daughter of Jerusalem!
  Behold, your king is coming to you;

### III. "Wonderful" Moment of Opportunity

- The opportunity and time for salvation is now!
- . <sup>20</sup> Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. <sup>21</sup> For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.
- **6** Working together with him, then, we appeal to you not to receive the grace of God in vain. <sup>2</sup> For he says,
  - "In a favorable time I listened to you, and in a day of salvation I have helped you."
- Behold, now is the favorable time; behold, now is the day of salvation. (2 Corinthians 5:20-6:2)
